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ENTRY FEE REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL DEPARTMENTS

As with most county fairs across the country, costs for putting on events like this have significantly increased. We will continue charging a small entry fee for all exhibitors, to help ensure the sustainability of the Fair. Entry fees are payable to the Gila County Fair, online when Entry Forms are completed through the online portal or in-person at the Globe-Miami Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday, September 13, 2023. No entry fees are required for showmanship classes, as no premiums are paid for these classes. See fee structure and examples below:

2023 FEE SCHEDULE

- LARGE ANIMALS: \$5.00 EACH EXHIBIT
- SMALL BARN ANIMALS: \$2.00 EACH EXHIBIT
- EXHIBIT HALL: \$1.00 EACH EXHIBIT

Examples:

- 1. Jane Smith enters 5 chickens and 5 exhibit hall items = \$15.00 fee
- 2. Joe Smith enters 2 chickens = \$4.00 fee
- 3. Billy Smith enters a steer and a goat and 1 exhibit hall item = \$11.00 fee

Premium checks will be available for <u>pick-up</u> on Sunday, September 24, 2023 8:30 am-1pm. Any Premium Checks not picked up, will be <u>mailed</u> to the address YOU ENTER into your ShoWorks entry portal , Monday, September 25, 2023 (please ensure we have the CORRECT address on file).

- Junior Market Livestock Auction proceeds checks will be available for pick up Tuesday , November 7th through Thursday, November 9th, 2023 . Location and time TBA.
 - NOTE: Any check not picked up in person 11/7-11/9-23, will be mailed Friday, November 10th, 2023.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. The Gila County Fair Committee, further known as the Committee, reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incident to the Fair.
- 2. The Committee reserves the right to add or to amend these rules as it, in its judgment, may deem necessary.
- 3. Any person who violates **any** of the regular or special rules will forfeit all privileges and awards.
- 4. The Committee will take every precaution to ensure proper protection and care of exhibits. Not withstanding these precautions the Committee will in no way be responsible for loss or damage to any exhibit or person. Each exhibitor or concessionaire will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done or occasioned by, or arising from any animal or article, exhibited by him and shall indemnify the Committee or any other officer or employee of the Gila County Fair against all legal proceedings in regard thereto. Presentation of entry blanks shall be deemed acceptance of this rule.
- 5. Exhibitor must present claim check in order to pick up entry.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Every entry shall be in the name of the maker or grower and shall have been made during the year of the fair, unless otherwise specified in the department rules.
- 2. Entries shall be made by full time residents of Gila County (having resided within the county for 90 days prior to the fair) or within 10-mile radius of Gila County.
- 3. All entry applications must be made on-line on the Gila County Fair website: gilacountyfair.com or at live entry at Globe/Miami Chamber of Commerce Wednesday, September 13th, 2023.
- 4. All exhibits must be adequately marked so they can be properly identified until placed on exhibit with an entry tag.
- 5. An exhibit item may be entered in only ONE of the county fairs: Payson, Young, or Globe.
- 6. Members of 4-H and/or FFA may enter only ONE of the county fairs (Payson, Young, or Globe). Any 4-H and/or FFA member who has completed his/her livestock project to date and whose animal places in the blue, red, white ribbon color group is eligible to sell ONE livestock animal and ONE small stock animal at the Gila County Fair Junior Livestock Auction. HOWEVER- All Grand and Reserve Champion large animals are required to sell at the Junior Livestock Auction.

The right is reserved to reject any entry offered for exhibition if the Committee deems it unfit or objectionable in any way.

ENTRY DEADLINES, REVEIVING/CHECK-IN, AND RELEASE TIMES

- All animal entries and corresponding showmanship entries (excluding dogs/horses) must be received on the Gila County Fair Website by Wednesday, June 7, 2023 (10pm). All remaining entries must be received on the Gila County Fair Website by Wednesday, September 13, 2023 (10 pm) or at the live entry event at the Globe-Miami Chamber of Commerce between the hours of 11 a.m. and 7 p.m., on Wednesday, September 13, 2023. Gila County Fair volunteers will be available to assist exhibitors in filling out entry forms on the computer.
- 2. All Exhibit Hall /Still exhibits except for fresh flowers, must be brought to the Boice Exhibit Hall at the Gila County Fairgrounds on Monday, September 18, 2023, between noon and 7 p.m.
- Livestock and small stock animals (excluding Horse & Dog Show entries) must arrive at the Livestock Pavilion between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Tuesday, September 19, 2023. <u>Please note</u>: There is now a mandatory check-in process-DO NOT CAGE/PEN YOUR LARGE/ SMALL STOCK ENTRIES UNTIL CHECK-IN IS COMPLETE AND YOU HAVE RECEIVED YOUR CAGE/PEN ASSIGNMENT from your Department Superintendent.
- 4. Fresh flowers and fresh flower arrangements should be brought to the Boice Exhibit Hall between 7 a.m. and 8:45 a.m. on Tuesday, September 19, 2023.
- 5. Judging of Still Exhibits, except for fresh flowers, will begin at 9 am Tuesday, September 19, 2023 but cannot be observed by the public. Animal judging can be watched but there must be NO interference with the judging.
- 4. The Boice Exhibit Hall will not be open to the public until 10 am Wednesday, September 20, 2023 except as subject to the above conditions.
- 5. No exhibits will be allowed to leave the fair grounds prior to daylight on the morning of Sunday, September 24, 2023. Exhibit Hall/Still exhibits will be released for pick up, Sunday, September 24, 2023 from 8:30am-1pm.
- 6. Failure to comply with the ruling will call for forfeiture of premium ribbons and awards. <u>Any property left longer than 2 days after dose of the fair becomes the property of the Gila County Fair</u>. Please make arrangements to pick up your entry on Sunday, September 24th.

SUPERINTENDENTS

- 1. It shall be the duty of each Superintendent to inform the judges of his/her department of the rules and regulations governing awards and to urge them to read the rules carefully before judging.
- 2. Each Superintendent is charged with caring for the judge's books of his/her department. He/she must see that all awards are properly entered therein, as it is only upon his/her record that premiums can be paid. Ribbons and tags are not acceptable for payment of awards. He/she must see that all judges' books are properly signed.
- 3. All judges' books must be returned to the Entry & Awards Chairman's office WITN-IN 30 MINUTES after judging is completed.

EXHIBITORS

- 1. Exhibit buildings will be open to the public daily between the hours of **10 a.m. and 10 p.m**. All exhibits will be ready to show during this time.
- Exhibitors of livestock must keep their animals uncovered between the hours of 10 a.m. and 10 p.m. Exhibitors of livestock must keep neat and clean that part of the stalls occupied by their animals. All litter must be deposited in a place to be designated by the superintendent of the department.
- 3. No attendant or other person will be allowed in show ring unless neatly dressed or in proper attire (please see Livestock rules pages).
- 4. Vehicular traffic necessary to livestock exhibitors must enter and exit with special passes.
- 5. **IMPORTANT**: Division and class numbers of the 75 +, Adult, and Youth sections are combined in all departments but are judged separately. Please use the proper division for the section you are entering.
- 6. Youth division exhibitors are under 18, with the exception of 4-H/FFA members who have already reached their 18th birthday but are completing their project years. All exhibitors must state their birth date.
- 7. Superintendents will make all assignments of space for exhibits. No exhibitors will be allowed into the exhibit area of the hall prior to the opening of the fair after drop off of exhibits.
- 8. Entry tags and claim tickets will be furnished at the time exhibits are brought to the Fairgrounds. These should be shown at pick up of exhibits.
- 9. All Superintendents, Attendants, Gatekeepers and Guards are instructed to prevent any attempt to remove any exhibit before the hour of release.

JUDGES AND JUDGING

- 1. Judging of Exhibit Hall/Still Entries will be held on Tuesday, September 19, 2023 .
- Judges must not award prizes to any unworthy exhibit. In any lots where there is no competition and if, in the opinion of the judges, no closely
 related lot exists to provide adequate and proper competition, the judges may award ribbons according to the merit of the exhibit and the Committee will pay corresponding premium awards.
- 3. It shall be at the discretion of the judge to combine or divide classes, if an insufficient number of entries in any one class does not provide adequate competition, or where entries warrant creation of a new lot..
- 4. Judges shall report to the Superintendent or Fair Chairman any person who in any way interferes with them or shows any disrespect to them during the judging.
- 5. The judges and persons acting as clerks to the judges must use special care, after award has been made, to see that the name is properly entered in the award book, for it is upon this entry that payment of premium is made.
- 6. The judge, superintendent and derk recording the awards of the department must sign the award book at the close of each class immediately after all awards in said class have been made.
- The Entry Clerk shall under no circumstances allow the Award Records to go from his/her possession, or to be inspected by anyone except authorized officers, until entries of the judges' decisions have been made, the records audited and closed.
- 8. If there is any question as to the regularity of an entry, or the right of any animal or article to compete in any class, the judge or judges shall report the same immediately to the superintendent in charge for adjustment.
- 9. The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases, except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of award, is apparent. In such case the fair chairman may make a decision or, with their approval, the matter may be referred to the fair committee, from whose decision there can be no appeal. In such case involving Livestock entries the Livestock Superintendent may make a decision or with their approval the matter may be referred to the Livestock Committee for whose decision there can be no appeal.
- 10. No exhibitor or person will be allowed, under any circumstance, to interfere with the judge(s) during their adjudication, or to offer any criticism of an exhibit or another exhibitor, and any exhibitor or person who shall attempt to interfere with the judge(s) in any such manner, whether verbally or otherwise, shall be excused from the area and from competition.
- 11. Other causes for disqualification of exhibitors are:
 - Unnecessary roughness or abuse of animals
 - Unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of the exhibitor, parent or leader
 - Abusive language on the part of the exhibitor, parent or leader.
 - Disqualification will be at the discretion of the judge, field judge or show superintendent.

PREMIUMS

- 1. Judges' books only shall be evidence for payment of premiums. Positively no ribbons or cards are accepted.
- Premium winners will be paid by check. Premium checks will be available for pick-up Sunday, September 24, 2023 from 8:30 am- 1 pm at the Boice Exhibit Hall. Any checks not picked up on September 24th, will be mailed the following day, unless other arrangements have been made, to the address you enter in the ShoWorks entry portal, when submitting your on-line entry. Please notify the Entries & Awards Chairman of any mailing address change.
- 3. The deadline for reporting any error in premiums paid is 10 days after close of Fair. After that time no changes will be made.
- 4. Premiums are \$3, \$2, and \$1, except as listed otherwise in the premium book. No Premiums are paid for Showmanship ribbons.

OPEN LIVESTOCK-SPECIAL REGULATIONS-

All Open Livestock entries are due on the Gila County Fair website by Wednesday , June 7, 2023.

_All exhibitors and livestock must be residents of Gila County, 90 days prior to county fair. All open livestock will have a designated stall provided. The livestock must remain in a designated stall prior to show and must leave the fairgrounds after the open show is completed. The feeding, watering and handling of the animals will be responsibilities of the owners while housed on the fairgrounds. The exhibitor is responsible to provide their own feed, feed pans and buckets. All open swine will use a "lick-it".

Exhibitors of livestock must keep space occupied by them and their animals neat and clean. All litter must be deposited in a place designated by the livestock superintendent. Stalls must be clean when animals are checked out. The exhibitor will lose premiums if not cleaned. No premiums, ribbons or decorations previously won by an animal shall be exhibited prior to judging. All class species and sizes are determined by the livestock superintendent. Lots may be combined when entries are less than three for competition at the discretion of the judge or superintendent.

Proper inspection paperwork must be completed and shown to the livestock superintendent prior to unloading livestock Diseased, unsightly or dangerous entries will not be admitted on the fairgrounds. Must have at least 3 entries in each division to hold showmanship classes. Exhibitors may enter one entry per class.

The livestock superintendent is the final authority on all matters concerning livestock.

Open Small Stock Rules and Regulations

The ownership deadline for small stock is 90 days before Thursday, September 23, 2022. Judging in the department will begin at approximately 10:00 am on Thursday. <u>The Gila County Fair shall reserve the right to limit entries to facilities available. Open exhibitors may enter up to ten animals in any class.</u> Exhibitors ages three through 5 may enter no more than one entry in each division. Exhibitors of livestock must keep space occupied by them and their animals neat and clean. All litter must be deposited in a place designated by the livestock superintendent. Cages must be clean when animals are checked out. The exhibitor will lose premiums if not deaned. The care of open entries will be supervised by the superintendent. Animals are not to be removed from their cages unless permitted by the superintendent. Open exhibitors must provide feeders and water containers for their animals. Only bedding provided by the fair can be used. If fewer than five entries of one breed variety are entered, two or more varieties, may be combined into one lot to be judged. Diseased, unsightly or dangerous entries will not be admitted to the show. The show superintendent has permission to remove or quarantine any sick or injured animals. Judges may eliminate from competition any small stock entered as a breed or variety not recognized.

All breeds of rabbits must be recognized by the American Rabbit Breeders Association standard of perfection. If a breed is not recognized, they will be entered into the pet class. Rabbits (over 6 months of age) must have a permanent mark with an ID number in the left ear. The number must be included on the entry form. Poultry, waterfowl and pigeons must be recognized breed and have a numbered ID band. This ID band must be included on the entry form. Turkeys, pigeons, geese, ducks, guineas, peafowl and pheasants must be entered as singles. Chickens may be entered as singles or trios. A trio consists of one male and two females that are the same breed, age, variety and size. The ID bands, breed and variety must be included on the entry form. Animals may be offered for sale by placing a for sale sign on the cage with name, address and phone number of owner, as well as the price of the animal. New owners may pick up their animals at closing checkout time and must present a sales receipt if the seller is not present.

LIVESTOCK RULES AND REGULATIONS 2023

Deadline for purchasing steers is May 1, 2023; swine, goats, lambs- June 1, 2023 Livestock Entry Forms are due- Wednesday June 7, 2023 Dog and Horse Entries are due - Wednesday, September 13, 2023

ALL GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS AS SPECIFIED BY THE GILA COUNTY FAIR APPLY. Please read them carefully.

Purchasing a livestock project does not guarantee that project(s) will be eligible to exhibit at the fair. Exhibiting at the fair does not guarantee that an animal will be sold at auction. Selling an animal at the Gila County Fair Auction does not guarantee a profit. It is not guaranteed that there will be a buyer for every animal.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Only Gila County 4-H and FFA members in good standing may enter this division. Members of 4-H and FFA may only enter at one county fair. Members may enter only those animals which have been used as their 4-H or FFA project for the current year. Exhibitors of large stock may initially enter two (2) entries per class but may exhibit only one animal per class during the fair. If more than one animal of the same species is entered, the Exhibitor must choose which animal will be designated as the market entry at fair weighin. The second animal may be entered in another class or in the Dept. A Open show following weigh-in. Exhibitors of small stock may enter and exhibit two (2) entries per class, per breed. Animals to be shown as breeding stock or prospects will not be required to sell at the Gila County Fair. No premium will be paid for breeding stock. All entry forms must be submitted electronically no later than 10 pm Wednesday June 7, 2023. The entry form portal will be available on the Gila County Fair website, through ShoWorks. You are responsible for entering in the correct Divisions and Classes. Copies of the following supporting documents must be submitted to your 4-H Leader or FFA Advisor by July 21, 2023, and received by the Gila County Fair's Livestock Committee no later than July 24, 2023; Seasonal Pass, YQCA Certificate, Bill of Sale and three required pictures. Required pictures are to be color, in print and consist of the following views: up close of the head with ear tag and/or markings; left and right-side views. The Exhibitor must appear in each picture.

- Bill of Sale must include date of sale, animals age at time of purchase by the Exhibitor (month and year acceptable), seller's name and address.
- All Livestock entering from out of state are required by the Arizona Department of Agriculture to have import permit number and health certificate issued by a veterinarian prior to obtaining Seasonal Pass.

RESPONSIBILITY

Exhibitor must have raised animal he/she shows and provide proof of ownership. Exceptions for Showmanship classes may be made by the Livestock Committee (should something happen to the Exhibitor's original animal). These situations will be handled on a oneon-one basis. Each Exhibitor must exhibit and care for his/her animal during weigh-in and for the duration of the fair. Exceptions can be made only by the Livestock Superintendent. The Exhibitor is responsible for the fitting and showing of their own animal and may assist and be assisted by others in this learning experience.

The Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) Class certification will be

required each year to enter the fair. This is a required class for all Exhibitors showing Large and Small stock in Department B. Dog and horse Exhibitors are encouraged to attend but <u>not required</u>.

<u>Deadline to complete YQCA class is July 21, 2023</u>, contact your FFA advisor, 4-H Extension Agent or leader for information on how to enroll in this class. A copy of the certificate must be submitted with your supporting documents.

Official Dress for the respective organizations will be required for all shows as well as the Livestock Auction.

- <u>Official 4-H Dress</u> A buttoned up, collared long sleeve shirt, of the appropriate 4-H colors of solid green, solid white, or a mix of green and white. No third color mix or additional colors are allowed. Long pants or knee length to longer skirt (dark color - blue or black jeans), belt, boots or closed toed shoes and green neckwear (tie, ribbon or scarf).
- <u>Official FFA Field Dress</u>- Official FFA Jacket, white collared button-down shirt, black or dark blue jeans, belt, closed toed shoes or boots, official tie or scarf.

SELF-INSPECTION SEASONAL PASS

A Self-Inspection Seasonal Pass is required for ALL (not just market) exhibition of cattle, sheep, goats and swine owned by Arizona residents and exhibited in Arizona according to state law (ARS3-3146. Section R3-27030). To receive a Seasonal Pass, Exhibitor must complete an application form with the Arizona Department of Agriculture. To obtain an application visit www.azda.gov. or call the Self-Inspection desk at 800-294-0305. Each Exhibitor is allowed to list up to ten animals on a pass. <u>The Exhibitor MUST have their</u> Seasonal Pass in their possession at the time of Fair check in.

EAR TAGGING

Steer tagging will occur on the second Thursday in May, with a make up day the following Saturday. Swine, Lamb and Goat tagging will occur on the second Thursday in July, with a make up day the following Saturday.

- May 11-Gila County Fairgrounds-(5-7pm) Steer
- May 13-Gila County Fairgrounds-(7—9am) Steer-Make up
- July 13-Gila County Fairgrounds (5-7pm) Swine, Lamb and Goat
- July 15-Gila County Fairgrounds-(7-9am) Swine, Lamb and Goat-Make up

All livestock animal entries must be tagged. (tag size will be specific to species). The Livestock Superintendent or his designee will tag up to two 4-H/ FFA animals per species per Exhibitor.

WEIGH-IN/CHECK-IN AND SIFTING

Fair weigh-in /CHECK-IN is Tuesday, September 19, 2023. Exhibitors will have from 3:00 pm until 7:00 pm to weigh-in.

<u>Unloading-</u> Designated unloading areas will be marked. Steers can be unloaded into the arena and tied to the fence or put in the pens near the scale, until ready to weigh. Pigs, lambs and goats can be put in their pens until ready to weigh-however ALL Livestock

Cont.-must go through the NEW-MANDATORY Check-in process as well. IF YOU DON'T "CHECK-IN", YOUR ENTRY WILL BE SCRATCHED <u>Pig unloading</u>: Pig unloading: There will be a designated area to unload trailers close to the pig barn, but you will not be allowed to back up to the pens. The Exhibitor must be able to walk his/her pig from the designated unloading area to the pig barn. <u>Weighing-</u> Upon arrival at the Fairgrounds the Exhibitor (not a Leader/Parent) is to check in with the Livestock Committee and all fair documents must be submitted before the animal is weighed. All animals must be dry and cleaned of excessive debris when weighed. You will be notified of the weight of your animal during the weigh in time frame and if you so choose, you can re-weigh once during the time frame up until 7:00 pm, which at that time, the weight of your animal will be official.

Sifting- All animals must be evaluated and approved by the sifting committee. Sifting will begin once the sifting committee arrives. Only the Exhibitor will handle his/her animal from the time it enters the holding area during sifting and weighing until excused by the sifting committee. Only the Exhibitor, sifting committee and the committee's helpers will be allowed in the sifting area. The judgement of the livestock and sifting committee is final. The Livestock Superintendent has the right and responsibility to reject any livestock exhibit showing evidence of disease, infection, or safety hazards to other animals, spectators or Exhibitors throughout the entire duration of the Fair. All market steers, lambs and goats must be dehorned (regrowth up to 1 ¼ inch will be allowed). Animals will be sifted if they exceed the maximum age. Unmanageable animals will be sifted and must be removed from the fairgrounds immediately. The sifting committee may sift at any time during the fair if an animal is unmanageable by the Exhibitor. Minimum weights will be strictly enforced, underweight animals will be sifted from the market class and cannot be sold in the Gila County Fair Livestock Auction. Underweight animals that are manageable may be used in the showmanship class to allow the Exhibitor to complete the year's project and they may also enter a prospect class. No excessive shrinkage of animals will be tolerated regardless of the distance traveled to weigh-in. The Gila County Fair Board and Livestock Committee wish to publish to the buyers the true and accurate weight of the animals at the official weigh-in. If any 4-H/ FFA member is concerned about shrinkage, the Livestock Committee suggests that the members arrive a day early at or near weigh-in site in order to give the animal the best opportunity to recover any lost weight. It is the responsibility of the 4-H/ FFA member to sell his/her own sifted animal. No advertising or "for sale" signs will be allowed in the livestock area.

*The use of prohibited substances in any animal such as antibiotics, growth stimulants, or tranquilizers without the prescription of a licensed veterinarian and proper documentation, is strictly forbidden by the Gila County Fair Rules and Federal Law. The fair Livestock Superintendent and/ or fair veterinarian may require drug testing on any animal exhibited at the Gila County Fair. Other causes for disqualification of Exhibitors include:

- a) Unnecessary roughness or abuse of animals.
- b) Unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of Exhibitor, parent or leader.
- c) Disrespectful behavior or abusive language on part of the Exhibitor, the Exhibitor's parents, or leader.

First Offense: Disqualification from the Class

Second Offense: Disqualification from the Show

APPEALS

All livestock appeals will be taken to the Livestock Superintendent who may make the decision, or with his/her approval the appeal may be referred to the Livestock Committee. All decisions by the Livestock Superintendent and/or Committee are final.

EXHIBIT AREA

All large livestock must be stalled in the designated stall areas. All pens must have an approved pen card, distributed by the fair. All animals must be manageable by the Exhibitor. Colored spray finish and/or colored mousse will not be allowed. Black may only be used on the hooves; all clear grooming/fitting products are allowed. Livestock barns are off limits after 10:00 pm unless approved by the Livestock Superintendent. It is the Exhibitor's responsibility to feed and water their animal throughout the duration of the fair. You should be aware of your animal's regular feeding schedule and keep to that schedule, to avoid disruption to their routine. You will be allowed to keep feed in front of your animals at all times during the fair, if you so desire. Cattle must be stalled with a halter, a neck rope and a butt rope. Exhibitors are expected to bring their own feed and appropriately sized feed and water bucket, with the exception of water for swine. All swine must use lickets; no buckets for watering will be allowed. Lickets will be provided by the Fair and Livestock Committee, or you can bring your own. Exhibitors are expected to keep their animal pens and adjacent walkways clean at all times. Each barn will have an area designated for tools/hoses. All tools/hoses must be put away and out of walkway areas except when being used for cleaning. There will be a Herdsman Award for each barn, given to the Exhibitor(s) who have been observed excelling at keeping their respective barns clean and presentable for the public.

CLASSES AND JUDGING

*Animals can be shown as market or breeding, but they can not be shown as both.

*Where there is no competition, judges may award one ribbon or no ribbon according to merit. What this means is, showing in a class with no competition does not guarantee you will be awarded Grand Champion. You need to show like you are being judged against others at top level to earn a ribbon or buckle.

Danish system ribbons will be awarded, BLUE, RED, or WHITE.

*Premium awards (Buckles/Banners) will only be awarded in classes with three or more entries in the class.

*Each Market Division will have market, showmanship, and carcass classes available.

*Gila County Bred & Fed classes will require at least two animals entered in each class to hold the class.

*The Gila County Bred & Fed classes will be held before market classes. Depending on class entries and weights, there will be a light, middle and heavy weight class for Gila County Bred and Fed animals. The top two animals in each class will be called back for Final Drive. After completion of market class of remaining animals, the top two animals of each weight class called in for Final Drive for selection of Grand & Reserve, and Gila County Bred and Fed Grand and Reserve.

*Each Breeding Division will have appropriate classes for species. If you do not have a market animal and wish to enter Showmanship, you may use your breeding stock for the Showmanship Class. Otherwise, you will enter your market animal for Showmanship.

*Wool Sheep Division will have appropriate classes for species and Showmanship available.

*Dairy Goat Division will have appropriate classes for species and Showmanship available.

*All other goat and sheep divisions will have appropriate classes for species and Showmanship available.

*All horse divisions will have appropriate classes for species. Please see rules from that section in fair book.

*Small stock and Dog division: Please see rules from that section in fair book.

AUCTION

Members of 4-H and FFA shall sell their animals at only one county fair. Any 4-H or FFA member showing a market steer, swine, sheep or goat and who has completed his/her livestock project to date and whose animal places in the blue, red, or white ribbon color group is eligible to sell one animal at the Gila County Fair Auction. A member may sell one large livestock lot and one small stock lot. If by chance an Exhibitor has two different species entered and both animals win Grand and/or Reserve Champion, both animals will sell at auction. All Grand and Reserve champions are required to sell at the Gila County Fair Auction.

All Exhibitors selling in the Gila County Livestock Auction must sign a waiver at weigh-in indicating which animal wiffsell waiving all rights to "no sale" of an animal. If an Exhibitor has more than one species entered in respective market classes the Exhibitor has until 5pm <u>Friday, September 22, 2023</u> to declare which species will sell, provided that neither animal placed Grand or Reserve Champion. All animals that enter the sale ring must sale. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor to be at the sale ring on time and know the sale order. The Exhibitor (seller) will be paid as soon as the Fair Committee processes each buyer's checks. All large livestock species will be sold/paid by the head. If drug or chemical residues are found in carcass tissue and/or the carcass is condemned, the Exhibitor will reimburse the Gila County Fair all premium monies, forfeit sale proceeds from the animal, and may be barred from future fairs.

The auction will be held on Saturday afternoon, however, Livestock will not be removed until Sunday morning. Each exhibitor is responsible for the feeding and care of his/her animal up until time of removal, and responsible for the cleaning of his/her exhibit area.

Small Stock Entries are due-Wednesday June 7, 2023. Dog and Horse Entries are due- September 13, 2023.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Only Gila County 4-H and FFA members in good standing may enter this division. Members of 4-H and FFA may only enter at one county fair. Members may enter only those animals which have been used as their 4-H or FFA project for the current year. Exhibitors of small stock may enter two entries per class. The exception are meat pens of rabbits and poultry, which are one entry per class – consisting of three animals/birds.

All entry forms must be submitted electronically no later than 10 pm Wednesday June 7, 2023. The entry form portal will be available on the Gila County Fair website, through ShoWorks. You are responsible for entering in the correct Divisions and Classes.

The Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) Class certification will be required for any exhibitor who will sell an animal at the auction.

Dog and horse Exhibitors are encouraged to attend but not required.

<u>Deadline to complete YQCA class is July 21, 2023</u>, contact your FFA advisor, 4-H Extension Agent or leader for information on how to enroll in this class. A copy of the certificate must be submitted to your 4-H Leader or FFA Advisor by **July 21, 2023** and received by the Gila County Fair's Livestock Committee no later than **July 24, 2023**.

RESPONSIBILITIES AND APPEALS

Exhibitor must have raised animal he/she shows. Exceptions for Showmanship classes may be made by the Livestock Committee (should something happen to the Exhibitor's original animal). These situations will be handled on a one on one basis. Each Exhibitor must be exhibit and care for his/her animal for the duration of the fair. Exceptions can be made only by the Superintendent. The Exhibitor is responsible for the showing of their own animal and may assist and be assisted by others in this learning experience. All livestock appeals will be taken to the Livestock Superintendent who may decide or with his approval, the matter may be referred to the Livestock Committee, from which decision there can be no appeal. All decisions by the Livestock Superintendent and/or Committee are final.

EXHIBIT AREA

Exhibitors of livestock must keep space occupied by them and their animals neat and clean. All litter must be deposited in a place designated by the Livestock Superintendent. Cages must be clean when animals are checked out. The Exhibitor will lose premiums if not cleaned. The care of open entries will be supervised by the Superintendent. Animals are not to be removed from their cages unless permitted by the Superintendent. Exhibitors must provide, feed, feeders and water containers for their animals. Only bedding provided by the fair can be used.

CLASSES AND JUDGING

If fewer than five entries of one breed variety are entered, two or more varieties may be combined into one lot to be judged. Diseased, unsightly or dangerous entries will not be admitted to the show. The Show Superintendent has permission to remove or quarantine any sick or injured animals. Judges may eliminate from competition any small stock entered as a breed or variety not recognized. The Danish System will be used to judge the small stock. Meat pens of poultry and rabbits should strive to be three animals/birds of the same breed that are as nearly identical as possible.

All breeds of rabbits must be recognized by the American Rabbit Breeders Association Standard of Perfection. The Danish system of judging will be used. If a breed is not recognized, they will be entered into the pet class. All rabbits must be three (3) months old by fair time, with the exception of Meat Pens, and fryer classes. Rabbits and cavies (over 6 months of age) must have a permanent mark with an ID number in the left ear. It is recommended that rabbits have a permanent tattoo; cavies have an ear-tag. The number must be included on the entry form. If the rabbit has a history of biting, a sign must be placed on the cage. Poultry, waterfowl and pigeons must be recognized breed and have a numbered ID band. This ID band must be included on the entry form. Turkeys, pigeons, geese, ducks, guineas, peafowl and pheasants must be entered as singles. Chickens may be entered as singles or trios. A trio consists of one male and two females that are the same breed, age, variety and size. The ID bands, breed and variety must be included on the entry form.

<u>Classes for 2023 will include market classes for rabbit, poultry and waterfowl</u>. To be entered in the rabbit, poultry, and waterfowl market class, the animal must be a recognized commercial or meat breed.

Official Dress for the respective organizations will be required for all shows as well as the Livestock Auction.

• <u>Official 4-H Dress</u> - A buttoned up, collared long sleeve shirt, of the appropriate 4-H colors of solid green, solid white, or a mix of green and white. No third color mix or additional colors are allowed. Long pants or knee length to longer skirt (dark color - blue or black jeans), belt, boots or closed toed shoes and green neckwear (tie, ribbon or scarf).

<u>Official FFA Field Dress</u>- Official FFA Jacket, white collared button-down shirt, black or dark blue jeans, belt, closed toed shoes or boots, official tie or scarf.

Fair weigh-in/CHECK-IN is <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>September 19</u>, 2023. Exhibitors will have from 3:00 pm until 7:00 pm to weigh-in. Turkeys must be weighed AT THIS TIME for an accurate accounting on the sale order. ALL Small stock must go through the NEW-MANDATORY Check-in process, DO NOT pen/cage your animals until this is complete. IF YOU DON'T "CHECK-IN", YOUR ENTRY WILL BE SCRATCHED.

AUCTION

The Small Stock Show is not a terminal show, and Exhibitors do not have to sell any lot in the auction, unless they choose to do so. Members of 4-H and FFA may enter, receive premiums, show and sell their animals at only one of the county fairs in Globe and Payson. Any 4-H or FFA member showing a Market Animal small stock species and who has completed his/her project to date-is eligible to sell one **small stock** Market animal, or one lot of Meat Pen at the Gila County Fair Auction. A member may sell one large livestock lot and one small stock lot. All Exhibitors selling in the Gila County Livestock Auction must sign a waiver at weigh-in indicating which animal will sell waiving all rights to "no sale" of an animal. All animals that enter the sale ring must sale. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor to be at the sale ring on time and know the sale order. The Exhibitor (seller) will be paid as soon as the Fair Committee processes each buyer's checks. All small stock will be paid by the lot.

Purchasing a livestock project does not guarantee that projects will eligible to exhibit at the fair. Exhibiting at the fair does not guarantee that an animal will be sold at auction. Selling an animal at the Gila County Fair Auction does not guarantee a profit. It is not guaranteed that there will be a buyer for every animal.

The auction will be held on Saturday afternoon, however, Livestock will not be removed until Sunday morning. Each exhibitor is responsible for the feeding and care of his/her animal up until time of removal, and responsible for the cleaning of his/her exhibit area.

Dog Entries are due - September 13, 2023.

ALL GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS AS SPECIFIED BY THE GILA COUNTY FAIR APPLY. Please read them carefully.

Entry Requirements

Only Gila County 4-H and FFA members in good standing may enter this division. Members may enter only those animals which have been used as their 4-H or FFA project for the current year. Dog Exhibitors are encouraged but <u>not required</u> to take the Youth for the Quality Car of Animals (YQCA) class.

Equipment

Crates need not be new, but must be intact and in good working order with latching door. Water must be offered to all dogs at least once every hour in a clean bowl. Equipment must be appropriate for the class, correct size, and in good repair. Muzzles or flexi leads are allowed. Maximum leash length is 6 ft.

Responsibilities

Official Dress of the respective organizations will be required for all shows.

- <u>Official 4-H Dress</u> A buttoned up, collared long sleeve shirt, of the appropriate 4-H colors of solid green, solid white, or a mix of green and white. No third color mix or additional colors are allowed. Long pants or knee length to longer skirt (dark color – blue or black jeans), belt, boots or closed toe shoes and green neckwear (tie, ribbon, or scarf).
- <u>Official FFA Field Dress</u>—Official FFA jacket, white collared button-down shirt, black or dark blue jeans, belt, closed toed shoes or boots, official tie or scarf.

Underwear should not be showing. No shorts allowed. Long hair must be pulled back and bangs kept out of eves. No rings, noticeable body jewelry, or dangly earrings. Nail polish should be clear or light colored if worn.

Animal Care

Dogs must be clean (white areas white!) and dark areas dark, free of parasites, mats, etc. Teeth should be clean of excessive tartar. Ears must be cleaned. Toenails must be trimmed. Coats should be in good conditions without bare spots, crusty lesions, or scabbed areas. Grooming should be appropriate for the breed and the dog should be groomed as close as possible to how it should appear in the show ring. (For example, shaved faces, feet, and tails for poodles.) Mixed breeds should be clean and well-groomed. A veterinarian will be consulted if there is any doubt about the health or safety of any dog, and their decision will be final. **Rabies certificate is required, and proof of distemper vaccination required. Bring photocopies of proof of both shots and turn them in to the Show Superintendent immediately on arrival. No exceptions.**

General Behavior

Causes for disqualification of Exhibitors:

- a) Unnecessary roughness or abuse of animals
- b) Un-sportsman like conduct on the part of the Exhibitor, Exhibitor's parents, or leader.
- c) Disrespectful behavior or abusive language on the part of the Exhibitor, Exhibitor's parents, or leader.

First offense: Disqualification from the class

Second offense: Disqualification from the show

No unsupervised children. 4-H members not in the show ring during the show must be with their dog waiting quietly in the waiting area or seated in the bleachers with the dog crated. 4-H members are expected to be courteous to those in the ring and remain quiet. Talking should be in low voices so as not to be disruptive to the dogs being shown. No running outside of the ring will be allowed. Dogs must be on a leash at all times unless they are in the obedience ring or are crated.



Dog and Horse Exhibitors are encouraged but <u>not required</u> to take the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) class.

RESPONSIBILITES

Horses must be entered under owner's name. Exhibitor, if different, should be noted. There will be no riding double in the horse show or fairgrounds. No running horses around the livestock and barn area. Any horse or Exhibitor causing a disturbance will be excused from performing. The Judge's decision if final. Western tack is required in western classes. The Fair Committee and/or Horse Superintendent reserves the right to combine or cancel classes with fewer than three entries. Spotters will be in arena for walk trot. Classes may be combined when entries are less than three for competition at the discretion of the judge or superintendent. No premium monies are paid for the showmanship classes.

Official Dress for the respective organizations will be required for all shows.

No third color mix or additional colors are allowed. - 2. All entries must be grown by the exhibitor. Entries should be named. Plants must have been in exhibitor's possession at least 3 months. Plants in hanging baskets must be entered in Division 102-105. Please bring your own hangers.
- 3. Judging will be variety against variety and color against color.
- 4. Exhibitor may have more than one entry in a class, if different in color or variety. No more than 4 entries per class.
- 5. No more than one person from the same address can exhibit in the same class.
- 6. Junior entries will be accepted in all Divisions and classes but will be judged separately.
- 7. Potted plants should have clean foliage, be free of insects, and leaves must be polished.

CANNING SPECIAL REGULATIONS

BEST OF SHOW-SPIRITS

- 1. All items must be made by the exhibitor since the previous fair.
- 2. Exhibitor's name must NOT be on jar. All jars must be labeled with:
 - Product name
 - Method of preservation, i.e. hot water bath or pressure cooker
 - Length of processing and altitude at which processed
 - Date of canning.
- 3. If the exhibitor chooses to have the larger jar remain unopened, an additional sample (4 ounce sealed container of the entered food) can accompany the entry. The entry will be judged based upon the food in that 4 ounce sample jar.
- 4. Canned products must be in standard canning or jelly jars or jelly glasses. No mayonnaise or other product jars will be accept ed.

All jars must have proper headspace:

- Pickles, canned fruit and juices, 1/2 inch
- Vegetables, 1 inch
- Jellies, 1/4 inch
- Meat, poultry and fish, 1 1/4"
- 5. No wax, paraffin, etc., accepted. All entries must be in sealed jars except in FREEZER JAMS.
- 6. Rings should be free from rust and scratches. Jars with rings that cannot be easily removed will not be judged.
- 7. DEFINITIONS:
 - JAM Fruit boiled with sugar to a thick consistency, without preserving the shape of the fruit.
 - JELLY Combination of fruit juice or juices with the right proportion of sugar, which cooked to the right stage, becomes a clear, sparkling tender, transparent, quivering mold.
 - BUTTER Smooth, even fine grained mixture of medium soft consistency, with no evidence of juice as a separate liquid. Butters are less sweet than jams.
 - PRESERVES Usually made of one fruit. More than one may be used. The fruit is whole or cut into large pieces and cooked in a syrup until clear and transparent, tender, firm crisp and plump. The shape of the fruit is retained. The juice is of a thick consistency, and enough to surround the fruit.
 - MARMALADE A clear jelly-like preserve with fruit, usually citrus, suspended in small pieces.
 - CONSERVE Jam-like product of two or more fruits, cooked to jam-like consistency with sugar. Usually contains nuts or raisins.

Turquoise must be labeled as to natural, stabilized or treated.

Entries will be received, judged and displayed in the Exhibit Hall (Receiving Monday, September 18, 2023 12p-7p).

Release: Sunday September 24, 2023. Judging: Tuesday, September 19, 2023.

Awards: Each project will be judged using the Danish system. Judges will award blue, red, and white ribbons. Premiums: Prize money will be awarded to blue, red, and white ribbons except for showmanship classifications. Cash values awarded will be as follows: Blue—\$3, Red—\$2, and White—\$1. Purple ribbons are available to all exhibits which the judge designates as outstanding and will not be awarded additional awards. Class winners will receive a Rosette. Best of Show will receive a rosette.

FFA Ag Mechanics Exhibitors:

- 1. Active Gila County FFA members must have made the projects between January and September of the current fair year.
- 2. All entries must list exhibitor names and contact information. Do not enter as a school.
- 3. Exhibitors will have the option to sell their projects at the Silent Auction while on display the Gila County Fair. Exhibitors MUST declare at the time of entry whether he/she will enter their project in the silent auction. If the exhibitor chooses not to sell in the auction, the item will be taken home for personal/ private use. No "for sale" signs may be posted on the project, and there will be no private treaty sales of projects while they are on display at the fair.
- 4. The Silent Auction will be Saturday, September 23, 2023, during the Youth Market Livestock Sale, Silent Bidding will end 30 minutes after the last large stock animal is sold. At that time, the bid sheets will be collected and full payment must be made by the highest bidder before the item will be allowed to leave the fairgrounds.
- 5. There will be a 5% commission deducted from the purchase price of each project. Exhibitor checks will be mailed to the FFA Advisor for disbursement after the fair. It is the responsibility of the Advisor to be sure thank you letters are sent by the exhibitors to the buyer.
