FAIR PARTICIPATION DISCLAIMER

By submitting an entry to the Gila County Fair, each exhibitor or concessionaire agrees to follow all rules and regulations set by the Gila County Fair Committee (“the Committee”). The Committee reserves the right to interpret, change, or add to these rules as needed. Decisions made by the Committee are final and binding.

The Committee will take reasonable steps to protect exhibits and ensure safety. However, it is not responsible for any loss, damage, or injury to exhibits, animals, or individuals. Exhibitors and concessionaires are fully responsible for any harm or damage caused by their entries and must cover any resulting legal claims or costs.

Submitting an entry form signifies your acceptance of these terms and conditions. A claim check must be presented to pick up your entry.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Entries must be made by the person who created or grew the item during the current fair year, unless stated otherwise.

Residency Requirement

- Exhibitors must be full-time residents of Gila County (living in the county for at least 90 days prior to the fair), or reside within 10 miles of the county border.
- Non-residents may display entries; however:
 - They are not eligible to receive premiums.
 - They must pay the \$3 exhibitor fee.

All competitive entries must be submitted between July 1st, 2026 and August 19th, 2026 online at www.gilacountyfair.com, or in person at the Live Entry Event on August 19th, 2026 at the Globe-Miami Chamber of Commerce between noon and 7:00 PM. **Entry fees are \$3 per entry.**

Each exhibit may only be entered at one county fair—either Payson or Globe.

The Committee may reject any entry it considers unsafe, inappropriate, or unfit for exhibition.

ENTRY DEADLINES AND RELEASE TIMES

- All Exhibit Hall/Still exhibits, except fresh flowers & culinary, must be brought to the Boice Exhibit Hall at the Gila County Fairgrounds on Friday, August 28th, between Noon and 7 p.m.
- Culinary (perishable items), Fresh flowers, and fresh floral arrangements must be delivered to the exhibit hall on the Tuesday of fair week, September 8th, 2026, between 6:30 a.m. and 9:00 a.m.
- Judging of all still exhibits will take place during receiving, depending on division and scheduling needs.
- The Boice Exhibit Hall will remain closed to the public August 28th, 2026 through September 8th, 2026.
- Best of Show awards will be determined only after all exhibits have been judged and ribbons have been awarded. Final selections will be made once all divisions are complete.
- Livestock and smallstock animals must arrive on Tuesday, September 8th, 2026. Weigh-in and sifting will take place between 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. that day.
- Animal judging may be observed from outside the show ring. No interference with judging is permitted.
- Boice Exhibit Hall will open to the public at Noon on the Wednesday of fair week, unless otherwise published.
- No exhibits may be removed before 10 a.m. on the Sunday, September 13th, 2026, following the fair. Early removal will result in forfeiture of premium ribbons and awards.
- Still Exhibits release is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on the Sunday, September 13th, 2026, after the fair. Livestock and Smallstock release will occur that morning per instructions from department superintendents, shared at the Youth Livestock and Smallstock Exhibitor/Parent meeting.
- Any property left longer than two days after the fair closes becomes the property of the Gila County Fair. Please arrange to pick up your entry on the Sunday following the fair.

- Exhibit buildings are open to the public daily from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. unless otherwise posted. All exhibits will be ready for viewing during these hours.
- Still exhibits will include divisions and classes for:
 - Youth Level 1 – Ages 4 & under
 - Youth Level 2 – Ages 5–8; simple, beginner-level projects
 - Youth Level 3 – Ages 9–13; intermediate projects with more complexity, detail, and clear themes
 - Youth Level 4 – Suggested ages 14–17; advanced creations with significant detail, technical elements, and storytelling
 - Youth Assisted – For youth who require assistance completing their project
 - Adult
 - Adult 75+
 - Person with Disability: Open to exhibitors of any age who identify as having a disability
 - Group/Family Entry: For collaborative entries created by two or more individuals
 - Professional: For individuals who earn income from their craft, trade, or creative work. This includes those who sell, teach, or produce work as part of a business or occupation. Entries in this division should reflect a high level of skill and presentation.

Division Eligibility Guidelines for Still Exhibits

To ensure fair and inclusive participation, all exhibitor entries must be placed in the appropriate division based on the exhibitor's age and experience. The exhibitor's age determines age as of January 1st of the fair year.

Youth exhibitors may enter in the division that best reflects their skill level, with the following guidelines:

- Younger youth may move up to a higher division if their project demonstrates advanced skill, detail, or complexity.
- Older youth may not move down to a lower division, regardless of experience level.
- Youth who require assistance to complete their project may enter in the Youth Assisted division, regardless of age.

- Livestock exhibitors must keep animals uncovered and visible between 10 a.m. and 10 p.m. unless otherwise posted.
- Livestock stall areas must be kept neat and clean. All litter must be placed in designated areas as directed by the department superintendent.
- Only attendants or participants in proper attire (see Livestock Rules) may enter the show ring.
- Livestock exhibitor vehicles must use designated passes for entry and exit.
- Division and class numbers for Adult, Adult 75+, and Youth sections are combined across departments but judged separately. Be sure to enter under the correct division.
- Youth exhibitors must be under 18, except for 4-H/FFA members who are completing their project year after turning 18. All youth exhibitors must provide their birth date.
- Superintendents make exhibit space assignments. Exhibitors may not enter exhibit areas after drop-off until the fair officially opens.
- Entry tags and claim tickets will be provided at drop-off and must be shown at pick-up.
- Fair staff are instructed to prevent the removal of any exhibit before the official release time.

Judging Guidelines and Danish System Overview



The Danish judging system will be used for all exhibitors, regardless of age or experience level.

All entries will be awarded ribbons based on merit, as determined by the judges. Fair management reserves the right to withhold or prohibit the display of any item deemed inappropriate or unsuitable for exhibition.

About the Danish Judging System

This system is designed to provide constructive feedback and recognize the effort of every exhibitor. Each entry is evaluated on its own merit using a set of criteria specific to its category. Entries are judged against an ideal standard—not against other entries.

Ribbon Awards

Exhibitors are awarded ribbons based on the merit of their work on their entry as follows:

Blue Ribbon (Excellent): Outstanding quality that meets or exceeds the highest standards.

Red Ribbon (Good): Good quality, meeting most category standards.

White Ribbon (Fair/Participation): Basic standards met, with commendable effort shown.

In addition to Danish system ribbons, **Best of Show** awards may be appointed by the judge or the Fair Chairman of the Board following the completion of all judging. These honors recognize entries that exemplify outstanding craftsmanship, creativity, and presentation across their category. While Best of Show may be awarded in any division and any class, it is not guaranteed and will only be given when an entry is deemed truly exceptional.

Judging Rules and Conduct

Judges will not award ribbons to entries that do not meet the merit requirements. Ribbons are awarded for all entries based on merit.

Judges may combine or divide classes if entry numbers are too low or if entries warrant a new category.

Any interference or disrespect toward judges must be reported to the Superintendent or Fair Chairman.

Judges and clerks must ensure accurate recording of awards, as these determine premium payments.

Judging Guidelines and Danish System Overview

Exhibit placings must be documented and signed by the judge, superintendent, and clerk immediately after each class is judged.

Award records are confidential until audited and finalized. Only authorized officers may inspect them.

Any questions about entry eligibility must be reported to the superintendent for resolution.

No exhibitor or individual may interfere with judging or criticize other entries. Violators will be removed from the area and disqualified.

Grounds for disqualification include:

- Rough or abusive treatment of animals
- Unsportsmanlike conduct by exhibitors, parents, or leaders
- Use of abusive language
- Final decision rests with the judge, field judge, or show superintendent

Premiums

- Only judges' books will be used to verify premium payments. Ribbons or cards are not accepted as proof of award.
- Premium checks will be available for pick-up at the Entries Office in the Boice Exhibit Hall on the Sunday following the fair, between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Checks not picked up during that time will be mailed the next day to the address provided in the ShoWorks entry portal. Please notify the Entries & Awards Chairman of any address changes.
- **All premium checks must be cashed within 90 days of issuance and will become void after that time.**
- Any errors in premium payments must be reported within 10 days after the fair closes. No corrections will be made after that deadline.

Premium amounts are:

\$3 for Blue Award (Excellent)

\$2 for Red Award (Good)

\$1 for White Award (Fair/Participation)

No premiums are awarded for Showmanship ribbons.

FAIR PASSES – EXHIBITORS



All 4-H and FFA youth exhibitors will receive one (1) wristband for their personal entry into the fair.

Families with livestock or small stock entries will receive one (1) parent pass to allow a designated adult to assist with animal care and supervision.

Example: The Smith family has four children enrolled in 4-H, each showing livestock. Each child receives their own wristband, and the family is issued one parent pass for an adult to oversee and assist with the animals during the fair.

For still exhibits (including Exhibit Hall entries), exhibitors will receive one (1) single-day entry pass. Additional passes or weekly wristbands may be purchased for \$20 each at entry drop-off.

Distribution of Passes:

Livestock and small stock exhibitors will receive their wristbands and parent pass in their exhibitor packets at weigh-in.

Still exhibit exhibitors will receive their passes at the time of exhibit check-in.

Youth with both livestock/small stock and still exhibit entries will receive all wristbands in their livestock exhibitor packet at weigh-in.

Entry fees are \$3.00 per entry. Each exhibitor will receive one (1) complimentary fair pass, regardless of the total number of entries submitted.

- All entries must be cleaned.
- LIMIT: (3) three entries per class per Exhibitor. Exhibitors can only enter one variety per class for entries.
- Members of a family are considered one exhibitor.
- Sheaf and Stalk exhibit will be judged for age value, and heads will be judged for grain value.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS – FLORICULTURE

- All floriculture entries must be delivered on Tuesday of fair week to ensure freshness for display.
- The exhibitor must water potted plants throughout the fair. Fair staff will not provide watering.
- Plants listed on conservation or protected species lists are prohibited, unless entered as cultivated potted specimens. A 3x5 card must be attached stating where the plant was obtained.
- All entries must be grown or arranged by the exhibitor.
- Entries should be clean, healthy, and free of pests.
- No artificial flowers, foliage, or sprayed/dyed plant material may be used.
- Exhibitors may enter up to 3 entries per class, provided each is a different variety or color.
- If multiple entries from the same household are considered for Best of Show, only the youth exhibitor will be eligible to receive the award.
- Junior entries are welcome in all divisions and will be judged separately.
- Hanging baskets must be entered in the designated division and include a hanger.
- All containers must be labeled with the exhibitor's name and address on the bottom.
- Commercial nursery pots are not allowed unless the plant has been transplanted into them.
- Judging will be based on variety, color, health, and presentation.

Culinary Arts

REGULATIONS

Welcome to the Culinary Arts Department! We celebrate homemade goodness, creativity and heritage. Here is what you need to know to enter with confidence:

General Requirements

- All entries must be delivered to the exhibit hall on Tuesday of fair week between 6:30 am and 9:00 am.
- Cookies & Cupcakes: Each entry must include six (6) cookies or six (6) cupcakes.
- Cakes:
 - All cakes must be placed on a cake board.
 - The cake must fit entirely within the cake board.
 - Cake boards may not exceed 10 inches in diameter or width.
- Containers:
 - Entries must be submitted in disposable, purchased containers such as plain white paper plates, foil pans, or disposable cake boards (not larger than 10 inches).
 - Mason jars are acceptable for canned items.
- **ALL FOOD WILL BE DISPOSED OF AFTER THE FAIR.**

Household & Entry Limits

- Each exhibitor may enter up to three items per class, provided each item is a different recipe or variety.
- Families may enter the same class, but not the same item. Example: One person enters chocolate chip cookies, another enters peanut butter cookies.
- If duplicate entries are submitted from the same household, only the youngest exhibitor's item will be judged.

Entry Requirements

- All food must be made from scratch – no boxed mixes or pre-made doughs.
- **EXCEPTION: The Battle of the Boxes** contest is the only category where boxed cake mixes are permitted. This special contest celebrates creativity and presentation using boxed cake as a base.

FFA members are encouraged to enter still exhibits that reflect the full scope of their projects—from mechanics and plant science to food systems and community service. You don't have to stick to just one area—if you raise animals, you can also submit a woodworking project, a conservation display, or a handmade product. This is your opportunity to share your talents, your growth, and your impact.

At the conclusion of the fair, FFA members may sell their projects. Sale items must be clearly marked with a “For Sale” tag, including pricing and contact information. All sales are private transactions between the exhibitor and buyer.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS

- Exhibitors must be active FFA members enrolled in agricultural education and approved by their chapter advisor.
- All entries must be the original work of the exhibitor and completed during the current membership year.
- Projects must reflect agricultural, mechanical, environmental, or leadership skills developed through FFA participation.
- Each exhibitor may enter up to three projects per division, provided each is a different item or concept.
- Sale items must be clearly marked with a “For Sale” tag provided at check-in. Pricing and contact information must be visible.
- Projects must be clean, safe, and ready for public display.
- Exhibitors are responsible for setting up and removing their projects according to the fair schedule.
- Judging will be based on workmanship, originality, relevance to FFA learning, and presentation.
- Unsportsmanlike conduct or failure to follow fair rules may result in disqualification and exhibit sale(s).

LIVESTOCK / SMALL STOCK / HORSE

Important Livestock Rules – Quick Reference

This section highlights frequently overlooked livestock rules and deadlines to help exhibitors prepare for the upcoming fair. It is intended as a quick reference only and does not replace the official Gila County Fair Livestock Rules.

Exhibitor Responsibility Notice

All exhibitors are responsible for reading and complying with the complete and official livestock rules as published on the Gila County Fair website. Rules, requirements, and procedures outlined online are considered the official and governing standards for participation. Failure to review and follow the official rules may result in disqualification or ineligibility to exhibit.

The following items are provided as reminders of critical requirements that are often missed:

Livestock Purchase Deadlines

- Steers: Must be purchased by May 1 each year
- Swine, Goats, and Lambs: Must be purchased by June 1 each year

Entry Forms

- Livestock entry forms are due the first Wednesday of June and must be submitted through the ShoWorks portal
- Horse and Dog entries are due through ShoWorks by August 19

Supporting Documents

Supporting documents must be submitted to your 4-H Leader or FFA Advisor by the last Wednesday of July, and received by the Livestock Committee no later than the last Friday of July.

Required documents include:

- Seasonal pass
- YQCA certification
- Bill of Sale
- Three (3) required photographs

Animal Eligibility

- The Gila County Fair does not accept intact livestock for exhibition or competition
- All animals must meet fair eligibility requirements prior to entry

Mandatory Sifting Process

- All livestock exhibitors must participate in a mandatory sifting process during check-in
- Animals will be evaluated for health, temperament, and compliance with fair rules
- This process is conducted to ensure the safety of exhibitors, animals, and the public

LIVESTOCK / SMALL STOCK / HORSE

EXHIBITOR QUICK GUIDE

(See full rules at Gila County Fair website for complete details)

Requirements

- Exhibitors must raise and show their own project animal and provide proof of ownership.
- YQCA certification is required for all large and small stock in Department K.
- Seasonal Pass required for cattle, sheep, goats, and swine (apply through AZ Dept. of Agriculture).
- Ear Tagging:
 - Steers – Dates as published on the website.
 - Swine, Lambs, Goats – Dates as published on the website

Official Dress

- 4-H: Long-sleeve collared shirt (solid green, solid white, or green/white mix), dark pants/skirt, belt, boots/closed-toe shoes, green neckwear.
- FFA: Official FFA Jacket, white collared shirt, dark jeans, belt, closed-toe shoes/boots, official tie/scarf.

Important Notes

- Purchasing an animal does not guarantee eligibility to show.
- Showing an animal does not guarantee a profit.
- Buyers are not guaranteed for every animal.

Auction Notes

- Grand and Reserve Champions are required to sell
- Exhibitors must sign a waiver at weigh-in indicating which animal will sell
- All animals entering the sale ring must sell

Final Authority

The Livestock Superintendent has full authority and final decision-making power regarding exhibitor and animal eligibility. Decisions made during the sifting process are final and not subject to appeal.

LIVESTOCK / SMALL STOCK / HORSE

LIVESTOCK SALE PROCEEDS & CHECK ISSUANCE

To promote transparency and set clear expectations, exhibitors and families should be aware of how livestock sale proceeds are processed following the fair.

Livestock sale checks cannot be issued until the Gila County Fair has received all buyer payments from the sale. Buyers operate under a variety of standard business payment terms, which may include Net 30, Net 60, Net 90, or longer, depending on the buyer's internal financial practices.

Because of this:

- The fair does not have access to all sale funds immediately following the auction
- Checks to exhibitors are issued only after all proceeds from the sale have been fully collected
- It may take up to 120 days following the conclusion of the fair for all payments to be received and exhibitor checks to be issued
- Delays in check issuance do not indicate non-payment by buyers or intentional withholding of funds by the fair

HORSE SHOW

Horse Show Overview

The Gila County Fair Horse Show is a sanctioned 4-H event and is governed by the 2025–2028 Arizona State 4-H Horse Show Rule Book. All exhibitors are expected to follow the official rules and regulations outlined in this document, which serves as the guiding standard for competition.

In addition, 4-H and FFA Official Dress is required for participation, as detailed in the rule book. This ensures consistency, fairness, and respect for the traditions of youth equestrian competition. Exhibitors and families should carefully review the rule book prior to the show to ensure full compliance and preparedness.

Bareback Horsemanship is offered as a special event at the Gila County Fair Horse Show. Riders must demonstrate readiness and safety before being allowed to compete. **All participants will go through a sifting process, and final approval must be granted by either the Horse Show Superintendent or the Fair Board President prior to entering the arena.** This requirement ensures that only qualified riders participate, maintaining the safety of both exhibitors and animals.

REGULATIONS

1. All entries must be the original work of the exhibitor and taken within the past year.
2. Five entries per class is allowed.
3. Photos may be developed or printed commercially.
4. Previously exhibited photos are not eligible.

Photo Size & Matting Requirements

- Prints must be between 5"x7" and 8"x10" in size.
- Each photo must be mounted on a mat not exceeding 11"x14"
- Mats must be cleanly cut and suitable for vertical or horizontal display.
- No frames, foam board, or posterboard allowed.
- This requirement ensures consistent presentation and safe, fair display for all entries.

Judging Criteria for Photography Entries

- Composition – How well the photo is framed and arranged; includes use of space, balance, and visual flow.
- Sharp Focus – Clarity and crispness of the subject; avoids blurriness unless intentionally used for artistic effect.
- Color & Lighting – Effective use of natural or artificial light and color tones to enhance mood, depth, and visibility.
- Print Quality – Clean presentation with good contrast, resolution, and surface finish; free from smudges or damage.
- Impact & Viewer Response – Emotional or visual effect on the viewer; how memorable, expressive, or thought-provoking the image is.

Requirements:

- Entries must be created by school-aged youth residing in Gila County, including public, charter, private, homeschool, online, and alternative education students.
- Schools may submit class projects, group displays, or individual student work.
- Youth may also enter projects individually, even if their school or teacher does not submit a group entry.
- Exhibits must be clean, safe, and ready for public display.
- **Classroom projects that are heavy or contain multiple layers must be mounted on foam board to ensure stability and proper display. This requirement helps prevent damage from heavy artwork mounted on bulletin board paper, which cannot support its weight.**
- Teachers may use up to two trifold foam boards per classroom display.
- On group projects, please indicate the number of students in the class on the back of the project so that participation ribbons can be provided for all students who took part.
- Teachers or school representatives are responsible for coordinating the delivery and pickup of classroom entries.
